## Scout, 10, Kept House as Mother Lay Dying; Orphaned With Brother, No Relatives Known

Ten weeks of the best kind of Boy Scout service in his own home ended yesterday for William Bode, 10 years old, with the death of his mother, Katherine, at her two-room, tenement at 510 East Fifth Street. While other boys were playing and swimming, William cooked the meals, ran errands, cared for his younger brother and in every other way shouldared the duties of his mother, who lay ill of pneumonia.

Yesterday morning William went to his mother's room to inform her that he had prepared her breakfast, as he had been doing. She failed to respond. A neighbor who had visited the home arrived with a basket of fruit while the boy still wondered at his mother's silence. It was apparent that the mother was dead. The police were notified and William and his 2-year-old brother George were taken to the Fifth Street Police Station.

news like a man and kept it from George, who walked about the police station wearing a policeman's cap and carrying a nightstick. The boys were taken to the Children's Society after policemen bought ice cream for them and tried to cheer them. No relatives are known. Mrs. Bode was 27 years old and since the death of her husband, two years ago, supported her small family by domestic work and cleaning offices. The police found that her funds at her death totaled only \$70. William's story of his conduct of the household amazed the police. He learned most of the details, he said, as a member of Troop 264 at Public School 64, in Ninth Street. But, the mending and shopping and the care of his brother were new fields that he had to conquer by himself. The boys will remain in the Children's Society care until a home is found for them.
